Dunedin Recycling

CURBSIDE RECYCLING:

See reverse for sample bin photo.



- aluminum cans
- glass bottles and jars (clear/no colors)
- mixed paper
- newspapers
- plastic bottles
- steel cans

To request a curbside bin, call the city at 298-3024.

YARD WASTE RECYCLING:

Place grass clippings and leaves in 32-gallon cans or bags (up to 50 pounds). Cut brush materials into 4 foot lengths and tie in bundles (up to 50 pounds).

DROP-OFF RECYCLING:

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING:

- electronics (such as TVs or computers)
fee = \$17.12 per electronic item

- Drop off cell phones or batteries inside the Solid Waste building, 1070 Virginia St., M-F 8am-4pm.

BUSINESS & MULTI-FAMILY RECYCLING:

Dunedin offers curbside rolling carts to collect: aluminum and steel cans, clear glass (no colors), mixed paper, newspaper, or plastic bottles (*one item per cart*). For cardboard recycling, you can request a large commercial container. To sign up, call 298-3215, ext. 24.

RECYCLING GUIDELINES

No plastic bags please!

Aluminum Cans – Empty aluminum cans used for drinks or food (such as soda or cat food cans). Rinse and crush if possible.

Cardboard – Clean, empty, dry corrugated (3-layer) cardboard boxes or packaging. Please flatten boxes. No pizza boxes.

Cell Phones – Any size, make, or model of cell phone.

Cooking Oil – Used liquid cooking oil (such as oil from a turkey fryer). No solids or motor oil.

Electronics - View a list of [hazardous electronic items](#).

Glass Bottles or Jars – Empty glass bottles or jars (clear only/no colors). Labels okay. No caps or lids.

Mixed Paper – Any clean, dry paper item that tears, such as white or colored paper, shredded paper, office paper, magazines, catalogs, phone books, junk mail, envelopes, wrapping paper, and paperboard items such as cereal boxes or paper towel rolls. No paper towels or tissues.

Newspapers – Clean and dry newspapers (including inserts). No string or twine. It's okay to put them inside a paper bag.

Phone Books – Recycle with mixed paper. Remove plastic wrap, bag, or magnets.

Plastic Bottles – Empty plastic bottles with a “neck” (opening smaller than the base) such as water, soda, shampoo, or ketchup bottles. No need to check for #1 or #2—just “check for a neck”. Bottles only; no tubs, cups, or bags. Labels okay. No caps or lids. Rinse and crush if possible.

Rechargeable Batteries – Nickel Cadmium (Ni-Cd), Nickel Metal Hydride (Ni-MH), Lithium Ion (Li-ion) and small sealed lead (Pb) weighing up to 2 lbs. each.

Steel (Tin) Cans – Empty steel cans used for food such as soup or vegetable cans. Labels and lids okay. No aerosol cans or paint cans. Rinse if possible.
